The Vestry Voice

Happy New Year! As this article is my last official duty as Vestry Secretary, I will be handing the reigns to the very capable Stephanie Smith for future publications of the Vestry Voice.

The Vestry met on January 16th and had the following discussions:

- Ending December 2017, Calvary had a \$21,253 budget surplus. Pledges, Undesignated Gifts and Easter Receipts were ahead of the budgeted amount. Calvary's Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (CEEP) expenses, Office Expenses and the severance package included in Bookkeeper Salary were over budget but due to budgeted items that were not realized in 2017, Search Expenses and the Diocesan Urban Mission, Calvary ended the fiscal year with the stated surplus.
- In the December meeting, the Vestry approved the 2018 Budget, but \$4,000 of Moving Expenses were not accounted for in the approved budget. Sally Reisz and the Budget Committee recommended correcting the 2018 budget by taking those funds out of General Facility Maintenance. The surplus can be allocated to the Preservation Fund by the Vestry once we have seen the Property Committee's prioritization of projects.
- The Endowment is now over \$8 Million due to strong investment performance, however Sally Reisz took the opportunity to remind the Vestry that the church should seek to reduce its reliance on the endowment through increased pledging.
- ♦ At the next Vestry meeting, the Parish Profile will be reviewed and then be ready for public discussion. The Vestry recommended a salary guideline for the Search Committee to include in the Parish Profile.
- Don Snow, Sally Reisz, and Jamie Hendon thanked the outgoing Vestry members (Meg Scharre, Penny Brisson, Tim Duncan, Bart Brown and Dean French) for their service during one of the most trying times in Calvary's history. It was also marked as a sign of vitality that there were 12 candidates for the Vestry election on January 21st where in the previous years there have only 5 or 7.
- ♦ Calvary's Well has been out nearly every day in the extreme cold weather. A great act of charity and ministry by those involved.
- ♦ The Vestry had a lively discussion about whether Calvary should have a person answer the phone rather than an answering service. This was an important discussion that stemmed from the Strategic Plan so that the Church would be more welcoming and attentive to the needs of its members and neighbors.

Earthy Thoughts

A Reflection on a Winter Morning The Garden of Goodness

Faith and Contradiction. There was a time when I thought those two words were utterly incompatible, enemies of one another. But as I get older I've come to believe that they are actually quite comfortable with one another, maybe even, inseparable.

- The universal Logos, the Cosmic Christ \dots and \dots the Jesus of Nazareth who washes his disciples' dirt and dung encrusted feet.
- The scorned poor, society's losers . . . and . . . God's honored guests seated at the head of the great banquet table in God's Kingdom.
- The Church's desire for strong leaders . . . and Jesus' call for simple servants.

- Life and then Death Death then Life.

On an especially raw morning during our recent cold spell, I went to check on the Garden of Goodness, and, at first glance, I wasn't sure that had been a good idea. What had just a few months ago been a place full of light and brilliant colors, life and bounty, now seemed so bleak and desolate. The summer row of sunflowers I had marveled at - how they danced back and forth in the wind and let the sun slowly, gently turn them in place - had become a line of brittle, bent-over stalks. The wildflower garden was no more

than the skeletons and dry bones of what once were blooms of red, yellow, purple. The last few autumn kale leaves still standing had shriveled and turned brown in a coating of ice.

Poet Christina Rossetti used a similar winter garden scene:

My life is like a faded leaf,

My harvest dwindled to a husk . . .

My life is like a frozen thing,

No bud nor greenness can I see.

Pretty grim stuff. Hold on, though. She's not finished, and I'm not done walking in the garden that winter morning. I went about gathering up trash and pulling up the last few dead plants for the compost pile and, wondering how deep the cold had gone, I picked at the ground with a trowel.

There they were, there, and then there, and no longer thinking about how cold it was, I went looking for more. Seeds. In the wildflower patch, in the sunflower rows, around and in the compost piles. Seeds.

My life is like a frozen thing, No bud nor greenness can I see: Yet rise it shall, the sap of Spring; O Jesus, rise in me.

Our poet finishes.

Faith's Great, Grand Contradiction of what we think we know - Life and Death - is in truth, Death then Life.

We can imagine Jesus picking up a handful of dried wheat and letting the seeds fall from his hands when we read his words to his disciples, "Unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed; but if it dies, it produces many seeds." (John 12:24) So that we understand that that there is more to this than a gardening tip, Jesus once again gathers his disciples, and this time a crowd as well, to declare that, "If anyone would follow me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." (Mark 8:34) Everyone in that first-century crowd knew that Jesus was talking about death, and not some difficulty or inconvenience we are complaining about when we say something or someone is our cross to bear. And to be sure that everyone will know that Jesus meant death in a more profound way than the physical sense, Luke adds the word 'daily' to 'take up their cross.' (Luke 9:23)

Calvary Rector Search

On Sunday, January 28, 2018, Search Committee members, Deborah Stewart, Bart Brown, Cindy Curry and Art Dietz were on hand in the Adult Forum to offer a review of the Congregational Assessment Results.

Deborah Stewart, chair of the Rector Search committee provided a brief overview of the results which included the following:

Survey Process Statistics:

Number of respondents: 115

Response rate as percentage of average attendance: 128%

Overall Satisfaction:

Overall 31% are satisfied with how things are in our church.

However, 53% are "on the fence."

Only 16% are dissatisfied.

Our overall rating of church satisfaction is LOW.

Overall Energy:

Overall, it seems that we are just going through the motions of church activity and there isn't much excitement about it among our members.

45% clearly disagree with that statement.

22% clearly agree with that statement.

33% are on the fence.

Our overall rating of church energy level is AVERAGE.

Attendance trend:

Compared with 3 years ago, 57 % said they attended worship about the same; 26% indicated they attend less and 17% said they attended more.

Our average annual attendance has decreased by 3 % in the past three years.

Value of Activity Beyond Worship:

When asked if participation in church activities were very meaningful, 67% clearly agreed; 31% were on the fence and 2% clearly disagreed.

Our rating of church activity beyond worship is AVERAGE.

Top Three Priorities:

When asked where additional energy should be placed to expand or improve our ministries these were the top three:

<u>First</u>: Make necessary changes to attract families with children to our church.

<u>Second</u>: Develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them in the life of the church.

Third: Provide more opportunities for Christian education and spiritual formation at every age and stage of life.

Calvary's Demographic Data:

61% are 65 and over.

16% are 55-64

15% are 45-54

5% are 35-44

2% are 25-24

1% are 19-24

Calvary is 98% white and 68% have graduate degrees.

The Energy-Satisfaction Map:

The levels of satisfaction and energy have been found to be reliable indicators of the health and vitality of a church. There are four quadrants on this map. **Calvary** falls in the **high-energy-low satisfaction** quadrant. Churches in this quadrant are often struggling to structure and channel their energy into a direction they feel good about.

Paul understood this when he wrote of his own personal transformation of Death then Life: "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me." (Galatians 2:20)

Death first, then Life - a new identity, a new way of being, centered in God, a birth to a deeper and higher Life in a growing relationship to the Giver of Life.

The now desolate Garden of Goodness will soon come back to life and will instruct us and show us again of the Creator's message about Death and about Life, as did a monastic garden for Thomas Merton:

I am here, planted as a seed in the cosmos . . . created by the Spirit in Christ.
I am here to grow.
