Drag Me to Church—J. C. Phelps

A drag show in a place of worship? Yes, we did that - and we did it quite well.

Calvary hosted the inaugural **Drag Me To Church** on June 30 to celebrate the end of Pride Month. To say that we simply hosted an event would be a hyperbolic understatement. We *filled the pews*—there wasn't an empty seat in sight, as over 500 individuals joined us for the evening! Thanks to everyone who made this evening possible, especially to Lee and our outstanding performers.

The event served a bipartite purpose. We wanted to host an event in our historic space that proclaimed God's love for all. As the Episcopal Church so often says, "God loves you, no exceptions." This proclamation embodies the Episcopal Church's legacy of inclusion and our ongoing aspiration to exemplify God's love for every human being. That love reigns true throughout Calvary each Sunday—and we made that abundantly clear at Drag Me To Church.

Secondly, we leveraged the event to raise awareness and funds for our beloved Food Ministry. The financial need to support the feeding of our neighbors continues to grow. The need is immense—and Calvary steps up to the plate. Drag Me To Church donated all proceeds to the food pantry, which to-taled over \$8,400, along with over 400 individual food items.

Why a drag show? While this article is far too short to explain the significance of drag, know this: if we're going to reach out in love to all, that means all—and by all, I also mean drag queens and the entirety of the LGBTQ+ community.

An event of this nature certainly meant a lot to many people. It certainly meant a lot to me. It was unlike anything that I've ever witnessed. The significance manifested differently and individually, largely contingent on the person's life story before sitting in our pews.

Representation matters. There's power in seeing someone like you represented in a space that historically has not boasted your identity. We accomplished just that with Drag Me To Church: a representation of a beautiful group of God's children and a display of God's welcoming and loving nature.

I was raised as both a preacher's kid and the grandson of a pastor in Southern Kentucky. The most ingrained lesson from my Christian education and foundation is that of the Fruits of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. I experienced these fruits—these emotions—during the planning and execution of Drag Me To Church. Each fruit reminded me of God's unwavering love and our daily covenant to display that love.

I'm proud to love my neighbors. I'm proud that Calvary loves its neighbors.

I've never been more proud to be a Christian.

A drag show in a place of worship? I can't wait to do it again.

Outreach

• The Food Ministry continues to hand out groceries to an increasing number of recipients. Donations of money are greatly appreciated.

Property

- The tuckpointing project is complete on the north side, but there are issues on the south side which have not yet been explained. This is keeping the plaster wet, and the job cannot be completed until the roofing company can discover the source of the water.
- One side of the choir loft roof had been repaired and the other side is under repair.
- A replacement sign for the parking lot is still in the works.
- Will Cary and Terrance Griffith have been able to come up with a solution to stabilize the handrails that lead to the rail.
- The Burial Ground and Courtyard is in terrible shape. We need new people to volunteer to help as the former volunteers are either of an age or no longer physically able to do the work. We also need a larger budget in order to pay Korhage to help with the more strenuous work.
- There is concern about the tree in Spalding's parking lot that has had rotten and weak limbs fall into our courtyard and damaged our patio furniture. Spalding is not willing to work with Calvary to remove the tree. We will investigate another solution.

Organ Update

- The Vestry met with Owen and Jacob for a session on the organ rejuvenation project. Owen proposed a much larger scope for the renovation and the Vestry approved.
- Due to the busy schedule of the Schroth Organ Builders, work on the organ cannot begin until the spring of 2024.
- As a side note to the organ repair, the Property Committee attendees brought up the subject that the marble floor in the choir and organ areas is in such bad shape that it must be repaired prior to the order rejuvenation.

Miscellany

- Calvary had a book reading in June; "Sparring in the Dark: The Art and Life of Henry Strater" by Michael Culver.
- Calvary was able to hire a new CPA.
- The annual picnic was well attended, and the Rector thanked all who helped set up, cleaned up and brought food.

- "Drag Me to Church" was a huge success with a full house of attendees. Calvary's Food Ministry received over \$8,200 in donations and \$400 in canned goods.
- On August 6, Calvary held a backpack blessing during the service.
- The Adult Forum starts back the Sunday after Labor Day, September 10, as do the full choir and Adult and Children's Christian Education.
- The Newcomers get-togethers are beginning again. They will be quarterly dinners rather than monthly lunches. The first dinner will be held at the Rector's home on August 20.
- The Master Chorale will be meeting at Calvary on Tuesdays.
- Many groups would like to meet at Calvary, but Tuesdays are too busy to accept another group. We welcome groups on other days of the week; the groups must include a Calvary member and must vacate the building by 10:30 PM.
- The General Convention will be held June 22-28, 2024. Meg Scharre is Calvary's coordinator and is looking for volunteers.
- Calvary is planning many fun events for the fall, including apple picking on September 16, and the annual St. Francis Celebration with Blessing of the Pets on October 4. Pumpkin carving, Friendsgiving and Evensong are also planned for the fall.

Habitat for Humanity Episcopal Churches Home Build

Calvary is co-sponsoring a Habitat for Humanity home, along with several other Episcopal churches. Construction began in April and is progressing very well. The home is about eight blocks east of Calvary, on


Calvary's Children—Callie Hausman, Christian Education Director



I'm writing this with a great sense of excitement about this coming year of music and worship at Calvary. First and foremost, as I enter my third year at Calvary, I'm excited to be partnering with our organist, Owen Sammons, to bring thoughtful and interesting programming to our church and community during our first full year of work together. We hope that you will find the music on Sunday morning to be a special part of your experience with Calvary, and we strive to bring the community into our doors through special musical offerings throughout the year. I want to highlight a few of the offerings that are coming up this semester.

- First, on October 29th we will be presenting **Choral Evensong** with a focus on women composers.
- We will follow this with a second annual joint **Messiah Sing-a-long** with Christ Church Cathedral and other invited churches on November 26th.
- On December 17th we will be presenting "Kentucky Lessons and Carols" that will be in the format of the traditional Advent Lessons and Carols service with musical contributions from Kentucky affiliated composers. Kentucky Lessons and Carols will also seek to highlight composers from diverse backgrounds who will bring their unique voices to the music.
- Finally, on December 19th Calvary will host the **Youth Performing Arts School Choirs** in concert that will bring the opportunity to open our doors to a large audience from the community.

Property Spotlight—Lynne Lyndrup, Property Committee

The **south side of the Nave around the Good Shepherd window** continues to contain vast amounts of moisture. Merrick Kemper continues to seek out the source of the water that is leaking into the tuckpointing. The scaffolding will stand until the plaster can dry out enough for the workmen to finish the job.

The **choir loft roof** was significantly damaged during one of Louisville's wind storms. After some time, a more efficient crew was sent to correct the initial problems with the repairs. One side has been completed and the other will be completed soon.

In July, a survey of the **Burial Ground and Courtyard** revealed many overgrown shrubs and a multitude of weeds and vines. Unfortunately, our team of volunteers have not be able to work the areas due to age and physical limitations. We are asking the Vestry for additional funding to hire more help from Korfhage.

We have discussed the **old tree in the Spalding parking lot** that has dropped large limbs into our Courtyard, damaging our patio furniture. Spalding is not willing to work with us in removing the tree, such as splitting the expense. We are looking at other alternatives to protect our Courtyard from further damage and the safety of our congregation.

Thanks to Will Cary and Terrance Griffith, the **handrails leading to the altar rail** have been stabilized! This has been an ongoing problem and we are thankful that these two have found a solution.

The committee also discussed other needed repairs to the church.

- Some of the gutters and many facia boards need to be repaired or replaced,
- the choir loft trim is rotting as are all the new window trim in both Parker Hall and Frazier Hall.
- Stephanie Smith is working on appropriate wording for a new sign for the parking lot.
- A huge safety concern is the Chancel marble floor, especially in the organ and choir areas. This expense was put off to accommodate the expense for the accessibility projects, but must be addressed soon.

We plan to ask for a larger budget from the Vestry to help make the needed repairs.

Food Closet Spotlight—Margaret Dickinson, Food Closet Coordinator

The Food Closet has been the beneficiary of hundreds of pounds of tomatoes and collards over the last month! Don and Susan Shepherd of Buechel Park Baptist church have been delivering to our food pantry as part of their Church Garden Ministry. It has been a major (and healthy) blessing. Suzanne writes:

"I retired at the end of 2011 and in the months before that I kept seeing news reports about food deserts in Louisville, so I got the idea for a Garden Ministry that would partner with local non-profits to provide fresh vegetables to low-income persons. We started with one garden at our church in 2012 and a couple years later expanded to three gardens. Church members with a double-wide lot offered half their lawn to us to turn into a vegetable garden. Another

church member offered a ¼ acre garden on her property. Every year of the Garden Ministry has been different as some doors close, but other doors always open. Getting in touch with you at Calvary Food Pantry is an example of a door that has opened for us. As some Buechel Park Baptist Church members have become unable to work in the gardens, mostly due to age, members of other churches have stepped in, so that over the past several years this ministry has been an inter-faith effort. The Garden Ministry includes people from two Catholic churches and another Cooperative Baptist Fellowship church. Since we started our Garden Ministry, we've grown, harvested, and delivered over 170,000 lbs. of vegetables. Tomatoes and collards have been our most popular vegetables".

Please keep your donations coming, as the need in our community never ceases!
