Music Matters—Jacob Cook, Director of Music

Advent and Christmas are always a time of extra festivity, and this year is no different, with a multitude of special concerts and services.

We opened our Advent season a bit early on **Nov 26th** - joining with the choir of Christ Church Cathedral to present the Christmas portion of **Handel's Messiah**. This year we were able to provide printed music scores for the audience to enhance the sing-along experience. I've received a lot of positive feedback from attendees who appreciated the opportunity to hear (and participate!) in this traditional musical offering.



On Thurs **Dec 14th at 7pm** we will welcome the **Louisville Guitar Society (LGS)** to the sanctuary to present a free concert. Director Ascher Taylor-Schroeder will lead the Louisville Guitar Orchestra, chamber groups and other local guitarists in an array of seasonal music. Stay after the main program for a special sing-along caroling session!





We are pleased to host the **Youth Performing Arts School (YPAS) Choirs** for their annual Winter Concert on Tuesday **Dec 19th at 7pm**. This free concert will feature <u>Sing!</u>, composed by Calvary's own Owen Sammons for Christ Church Cathedral as part of their 200th Anniversary celebration. Other featured works include Charpentier's *Messe de minuit pour Noël* (Midnight Mass for Christmas) and Kim Andre' Arnesen's *Magnificat*. All five of the YPAS choirs will perform (Concert Choir, Tenor Bass Choir, Soprano Alto Choir, Chamber Choir, 9th grade choir) accompanied by Owen

Sammons on organ and members of the Symphonic Arts Orchestra.

Calvary's Annual and much-loved **Lessons and Carols** service is set for Sunday **Dec 17th at 3:30 pm**. This year we are offering a 'Kentucky flavored' service featuring carols by Kentucky composers and poets including John Jacob Niles, Daniel Gilliam (a familiar voice on WUOL) Owen Sammons, Margaret Dickinson, and Jonathan Smith. We will also feature other familiar carols from around the world.

We culminate the season on **Christmas Eve** with special prelude music beginning at **3:30** before the 4:00 service.

We are excited to have a string orchestra made up of Calvary members Judy and Rosemary Wilson, Cynthia Racine, and Emery and Nino Tran, as well as Margaret Dickinson on the organ, and of course, Calvary's choir accompanied by Owen Sammons.

During the service, Calvary Children's Choir will sing the Offertory Anthems Let There Be Peace on Earth and Noel! Sing Noel!. The Children's Choir is directed by Katie Cook and will be accompanied by Jeremy Rhodes on guitar and Owen Sammons on organ.


Thank you to all the musicians, both singers and instrumentalists, sharing their talents during Advent!

Music Notes—Owen Sammons, Organist

You may have noticed several occurrences in our recent bulletins where there is no prelude and/or postlude listed. This is not an omission but an allowance for liturgical and musical spontaneity. The pre/postludes in these instances are improvised musical meditations, usually borrowing melodic themes from the music planned for the service and stitching these themes together. These meditations are usually set in a particular style (baroque, romantic, modern, etc.) and introduce (in the prelude) or reinforce (in the postlude) particular moments of musical interest throughout the service. These are, effectively, new pieces of music, created in the moment, heavily influenced by the vibe of the room.



One of my earliest memories is of a plastic electric toy piano that could only play one note at a time. This toy piano was a true vehicle for learn-

ing, as it was the first time I experimented with playing "by ear." And, although my parents recognized my affinity for keyboard instruments and put me in piano lessons at the age of seven, my inclination to play "by ear" has never wavered.

While my improvisations are highly influenced by my playing-by-ear abilities, it must be said that no successful improvisation is without preparation. I really try to bond with the music chosen for each service,

which is aided by our Wednesday evening choir rehearsals. I've usually landed on specific themes and musical styles by the end of my practice time on Friday, and by Sunday morning, it's "in God's hands," so to speak.

It is a true blessing to be the organist at Calvary, as this is such an open place—open to all people, and especially open to the arts and artistic creativity.



The Elliot-Baker wall at the Good Shepard window is almost complete! The old, crumbling paster has been removed, a fresh coat of plaster has been applied, the scaffolding has been taken down, and The Rev. Elliot-Baker's plaque is back in its rightful place. Once the new plaster has completely cured, the wall will receive its finishing coats of paint. Pictured are Will Cary, Nick Stouffer and Will from Minor's Electric, a friend of Will Cary's who volunteered to help hang the heavy plaque.

The hackberry tree in Spalding's parking lot that was a threat to Calvary's Parker Hall and playground has been removed.LimbWalker was able to complete the job in just a few hours on a Tuesday morning in October.









There is a new sign in the shared parking lot of the Unitarian and Calvary churches. It no longer mentions Presentation as they discontinued use of the lot.

The Burial Ground and Courtyard are now in good condition after not having been attended for some time. The fountain was repaired, weeds were pulled, and the grass mowed.

The choir loft roof that had a significant leak has finally been repaired by a reputable crew.

There is more work to be done in 2024:

The second-floor classroom needs a new floor.



- There are ten windows in the office section of the church that need to be replaced.
- The marble floor in the Chancel is scheduled to be repaired.
- The organ must undergo a total rejuvenation. This is not a Property Committee project, but it is
 mentioned here because the floor beneath the organ must be repaired before the organ can be
 reinstalled.

Many thanks to everyone who has donated for the jams, jellies, and pickles I've made. More than 500 jars have been filled and over \$1500 dollars have been collected since May. All proceeds benefit Calvary's food pantry. There are still plenty of jars left, including lots of pickled okra. 


Food Closet Spotlight—Margaret Dickinson, Food Closet Coordinator

Want to know what goes on in the Calvary Food Pantry? Read on for a description of the last day of November:

- 106 clients received
- 212 bags serving
- 245 people.

It was super donation day that began with us being armed with great meats, sweets and breads provided by our super Brian. Tomato Baptists came early (8) with cabbages, collards, mustard greens, coats and hats; then David Gray with 13 bags of bagels; then Mark with 3 PB cases; then Joseph with 136 Macs; then St. Pauls with 596 items; then Kentucky Harvest with sandwiches; then Central Presbyterian with canned goods; then the St Paul's Plumber with homemade biscuits and cookies; then the second coming of Kentucky Harvest featuring 27 pizzas and unbaked cookie dough! Our faithful volunteers (now numbering 53 in various capacities) were hopping.



Monthly November stats include 2954 bags serving 3674 people. This includes our collaborative CLCM Thanksgiving giveaway with 250 turkeys and 43 hams. If you've read this far, you must agree it was another WOW day! As we finish off November, stats are 52,812 bags serving 63,555! Editor's Note: As you do your holiday grocery shopping, please consider picking up extra items for Calvary's Food pantry to help those who are hungry. Tuna, peanut butter, cereal, and canned goods are always welcome.





A Cup of Cold Water—Burnell Esbenshade, Grants Committee

The Calvary Grants Committee is pleased to announce that Calvary has responded to the great need of the people of the island of Maui, which has been largely destroyed by wildfires. A grant in the amount of \$3000 has been given to "A Cup of Cold Water" (ACCW).



"A Cup of Cold Water" is a volunteer, mobile ministry of the Diocese of Hawaii. Begun ten years ago as a ministry to the homeless, it is now serving the overwhelming number of those left homeless or needy by the wildfires. They have the benefit of knowledge of the destroyed neighborhoods and the trust of the people there.

ACCW addresses the most urgent needs:

- · chilled water
- hygiene
- · basic first aid
- food
- clothing

If you know of a community need that could be addressed by some support from Calvary, remember that you are invited to apply for a grant. See any member of the Vestry or Grants Committee for additional information.

We'd like to thank all who helped with these events. And as always, a big thanks to all who volunteer to host coffee hour. This, too, is important to our ministry.



New Book by Calvary Author

Parishioner Jonathan Smith has authored a book just published by Edinburgh University Press, titled Sidney's Astrophil and Stella: A Reader's Guide. The book is written in "plain English," and is based on Smith's more than forty years of teaching poetry in college classrooms. It was selected for publication as a special "double issue" celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of the Ben Jonson Journal, whose editor, Robert Evans, writes that this is the first time anyone has ever attempted a close reading of all 108 sonnets and eleven songs in Philip Sidney's masterpiece, which was first published posthumously in 1591. The book is available to order from Carmichael's Bookstore. The author, who has written frequently for the Calvary Connection, said he was glad to have the Sidney project completed so he can give full attention to a book on Calvary's stained glass windows.

Outreach

- The Food Ministry continues to hand out groceries to an increasing number of recipients. Donations of canned goods are appreciated, as well as money donations. Grocery runs occur almost every day.
- The Thanksgiving turkey giveaway was successful again this year. Not only did recipients receive a turkey, but trimmings were also included.
- Calvary's Well continues to serve sandwiches and puddings, as well as hand out socks, once a
 week. Volunteers would be appreciated.

Property

- The scaffolding was finally removed from around the Good Shepherd window and the Elliot Baker plaque reinstalled.
- The hackberry tree that was in Spalding's parking lot but overhanging into Calvary's courtyard and Parker Hall, has been removed.
- A new sign, indicating that the parking lot between the Unitarian Church and Calvary is for the church's use, has been installed.
- The Burial Ground and Courtyard are back in good shape.
- The choir loft roof has been repaired.

Stewardship

- The Stewardship Committee kicked off their month of gathering pledges with a horse race theme and special coffee hour.
- At the time of this writing, 90% of pledges have been received.

Parish Life

- The Bishop's visit with Welcome Confirmands and Urban Partnership combined with coffee hour and was well attended.
- The Blessing of the Animals was held in the Courtyard this year with a few well-behaved animals in attendance.



Christian Education—notes from Callie Hausman to the Vestry

- A few young women have begun helping with Children's Worship.
- Classes and music rehearsals began on September 10.
- The class moved to Room 204 because Room 205 became too crowded.
- Christmas Pageant rehearsals have started.
- Planning and organizing for acolytes have started.





Diocese of Kentucky 196th Annual Convention—Barry Richardson

The Diocesan convention was held in Bowling Green on November 10-11.

Several workshops were given and attended, two in particular; Safe Church, Safe Communities program has been revamped with Whit Stodghill as the Coordinator. This is a more structured approach from the National Church, and we can expect to see more about it in the coming months. Second, in case you didn't know the 81st General Convention (of the Episcopal Church) will be held in Louisville on June 23-28, 2024. As we can expect around 8000 Episcopalians to descend on Louisville, there are many opportunities to volunteer to help with this event. Meg Scharre is the volunteer coordinator for Calvary, so please line up to offer your help!

Convention was well organized and ran smoothly; there were no "issues" and it all went quite fast. Many thanks to Christ Church Bowling Green for hosting.

The 197th Annual Convention will be held at St. Luke's church, Anchorage on November 8-9, 2024.
