The First Lesson 2 Kings 2:1-12

Reader: A Reading from the second Book of Kings.

When the LORD was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent." Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the LORD has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the LORD will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the LORD has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the LORD lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

The Psalm is sung by the choir.



For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. The Holy Gospel Mark 9: 2-9

The Priest reads the Gospel, first saying.

Celebrant The holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.



Celebrant and People.





#### **Choral Music Notes:**

**Herbert Howells** is called "the arch-priest of Impressionism in English church music" by Kenneth Long. His distinct style is apparent to most listeners in his sensitivity to words, colored with lush harmonies. Howells studied under Herbert Brewer at Gloucester Cathedral, and Stanford at the Royal College of Music. **My eyes for beauty pine** is strophic, set in three unison stanzas. Howells only breaks the choir into four parts at the end of the middle stanza – even for a brief moment of *a Capella* singing. The middle stanza is also transposed up a third, providing rich variety to an otherwise simple anthem.

**Rev. Sir Frederick Gore Ouseley** made a significant contribution to church music especially by the founding of St. Michael's College, Tenbury. He also worked as a musicologist piecing together works by Gibbons and studying early Spanish musical treatises. Out of the seventy anthems he composed during his life time, **From the rising of the sun** is one of only a handful which still holds a valued place among church choirs today. One may hear the academic within Ouseley coming forth in this piece – straightforward but effective. He uses well, those moments when a section of the choir sings alone for maybe two or three words.

# **Organ Music Notes:**

Henry Purcell was an English organist and composer during the late 17<sup>th</sup> century. As a child, he sang in the chorus of the Chapel Royal and later studied under John Blow. He served as organist of Westminster Abbey and was considered England's greatest composer. One of his most important works was the chamber opera *Dido and Aeneas*. Trumpet pieces under the title *Trumpet Tune* or *Trumpet Voluntary* etc. were not uncommon during Purcell's time. Often these pieces have a main theme that returns at least once and one or two contrasting sections which generally make up a short piece of about three minutes.

**Marcel Lanquetuit** was a 20<sup>th</sup> century French organist. He studied at the Paris Conservatory under Eugene Gigout and one first prize for organ in 1914. He served in the armed forces for the next five years during WWI and toured the US as a recitalist later in 1926. He served as principal organist at Rouen Cathedral for forty years and filled in for Marcel Dupré from time to time at Saint-Sulpice, Paris. He also taught organ at the Rouen Conservatory for fifteen years. Lanquetuit preferred to improvise and consequently did not compose as much music. Sadly, much of his music was destroyed in a house fire in 1940.

This **Toccata** is what his reputation as a composer is entirely based on clearly falling in line with the French Toccata tradition of Dubois and Widor.
