

This special edition of the *Calvary Connection* presents the slate of candidates for the Vestry election at the Annual Meeting, to be held in the church Sunday, June 27, after the 10:30 service. Five new members will be elected to three-year terms (dated from the beginning of 2021). The candidates are listed below in alphabetical order, and the biographical statements are in their own words.

I was born and raised in Hopkinsville, KY, raised in a lovely Baptist church there. At about age 12 I spent the night with a friend at her grandmother's who "made" us go to church with her. It was Grace Episcopal Church - I loved it! I decided then that I wanted to be an Episcopalian but the rector, a friend of my parents, told them I was too young to be confirmed. I finally was confirmed in the early sixties at St. Paul's Episcopal Church after moving to Louisville. While there I taught Sunday School, sang in the choir and helped with Vacation Bible School. In the early eighties I'd been attending St. Mark's on Frankfort Avenue when I was stolen away from there by my friend, Katherine Luckett (now Reed), who assured me I would just love Calvary. And of course I did. I have been here ever since. This church and its members have meant so much to me and my family. All my children and grandchildren have been baptized and/or confirmed here.

I am a Registered Nurse by training and have degrees in Psychology and Philosophy. I worked at Methodist Hospital then University Hospital prior to pursuing a career as a Clinical Research Associate. I monitored and managed sites throughout the U S where new drugs were being tested on patients. I have been retired for four years but still have an active nursing license. I volunteer as a nurse at Family Community Clinic at St. Joseph Catholic Church and was proud to be a volunteer to administer the Covid vaccine.

During my years here I have been on the Altar Guild and twice have been chair of the Hospitality Committee. While I do not know the specifics of the Vestry Committees I am certainly aware of their function. I should be very honored and proud to be a member. We at Calvary are privileged to be a warm and accepting people in a beautiful space with high standards of heavenly music and graceful liturgy.
