Welcome to Calvary Episcopal Church.


Calvary is the home of a community of people who seek to make the church a place of welcome, service, and beauty.

A Reading from the Book of the prophet Isaiah.



The Holy Gospel John 1:6-8,19-28

The Priest reads the Gospel, first saying.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, "Who are you?" He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, "I am not the Messiah." And they asked him, "What then? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not." "Are you the prophet?" He answered, "No." Then they said to him, "Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" He said, "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,'" as the prophet Isaiah said. Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. They asked him, "Why then are you baptizing if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?" John answered them, "I baptize with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal." This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptizing.







The Postlude

Herr Christ, der einig Gottes Sohn, BWV 601

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Choral Music Notes:

Orlando Gibbons was an English organist and composer of the late Renaissance. Like Bach, he belonged to a musical family. His father and three brothers were all musicians, and as a young boy he sang in his brother's choir at King's College, Cambridge. He served as organist of the Chapel Royal and Westminster Abbey as did his son, Christopher. **This is the record of John** is his most famous verse anthem. A verse anthem is a genre from the Renaissance which alternates a solo voice with the whole choir. In this case, the solo is an alto (or counter-tenor). Gibbons is quite attentive to the text. His rhetorical repetitions of the "from Jerusalem" and "Art thou Elias?" are written higher the second time for emphasis. He adds many fast notes for "I am not the Christ" as if to emphatically claim in the way John the Baptist may have done. Finally, he reserves the highest note for the word "crieth" in the phrase "that crieth in the wilderness."

Paul Manz was an American composer for the organ and chorus. His most famous piece is the Advent motet, **E'en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come**. Its genesis comes from a demanding time for the Manz family, when their three-year-old son, John, fell terribly ill with double pneumonia. While Paul and his wife, Ruth, gave John twenty-four-hour care, they were inspired to write this piece as a reflection on their experience and a dedication to their son. Paul composed the music, and Ruth wrote the text based on Revelation 22. John recovered and later became a Lutheran Pastor.

Organ Music Notes:

The prelude and postlude this morning are two settings of the German Advent chorale, **Herr Christ, der einig Gottes Sohn**, by **Buxtehude** and **Bach** respectively. As is typical for **Buxtehude's** organ chorale settings, the tune is placed in the upper register and decorated with improvisations while the lower three parts accompany. Each phrase of the melody is separated by an interlude played by the accompaniment.

Bach's setting comes from his "Little Organ Book" which contains small chorale settings used as teaching pieces. Typical for this publication, although not exclusive, the accompaniment voices are filled with fragments of imitation with the tune clearly pronounced above.
